Scientist of the Year Dinner 2017

ARCS Scholars, members, and supporters will gather at the Sheraton Hotel and Marina on Harbor Island on April 28th for the 2017 Scientist of the Year Dinner. This year's recipient is Dr. Karen E. Nelson, President of the J. Craig Venter Institute, a renowned scientist widely recognized for her work in the microbiome area. At the cocktail reception, which begins at 6:00 PM, our Scholars will be displaying posters of their research and discussing it with interested members and guests. Following the traditional entrance of our Scholars, an elegant dinner will be served, with a choice of beef short ribs, mahi mahi, or vegetarian. The evening will continue after dinner with a talk by our Scientist of the Year, enlightening the guests about the astounding findings in the field of microbiome research, followed by presentation of her award.

San Diego has earned a reputation as the "genomics capital of the world," because it has attracted top scientists like Dr. Nelson. She heads the Microbiome group at Human Longevity, Inc., La Jolla, and is Editor in Chief of the journal *Microbial Ecology*. Serving on many other boards, including the National

Academy Board of Life Sciences and the NIH-NIAID council, she is also a Fellow of the American Academy of Microbiology, an honorary professor at the University of the West Indies, and a Helmholtz International Fellow.

Also joining us on April 28th will be Peter Ho, an ARCS Scholar Alumnus, who will explain how ARCS support helped further his career. Raffle tickets will be available for \$20 to win a "Staycation" contributed by the Sheraton Hotel, consisting of a one-night stay, breakfast, and a one-hour spa treatment for two. News From National

In mid-January Helga Moore, our co-president-elect, and I traveled to Phoenix, Arizona, for the ARCS Foundation, Inc., National Board meeting. It was there I introduced Helga to the Council of Presidents. I think it was a real eye-opener for her to see and meet the wonderful women from around the country who work to keep this organization a viable entity. Some of our chapters are struggling to get started, such as Tampa Bay and Minnesota. Others are long-time chapters, which, in their former years, were real powerhouses, but with time, membership began to age and decline. Today, Chicago is at a point where it is considering closing its doors. Hats off to San Diego's Membership Committee, who have done a bang-up job of bringing in new and younger members! I can almost feel a renaissance of sorts in our chapter. It takes visionaries to create this upswing of interest and vitality.

Helga was also introduced to Lennard A. Fisk, PhD., Distinguished Professor of Space Science at the University of Michigan. Dr. Fisk is chair of the Science, Engineering and Advisory Committee (SEAC) for the National Board of ARCS Foundation, Inc. Fisk and thirteen others are advisors to us in Science and Technology issues. He mentioned that in spring 2018 there will be a national conference of leading space organizations: JPL, NASA, and others involved in space exploration. He thought it might be possible for ARCS to have a table there, along with our Scholars who are involved in astrophysics and space systems. What an opportunity for us to have exposure to an entirely new entity.

Plans for restructuring the National Board were brought up to the Presidents' Council, and, as expected, were met with alarm and concern by the presidents of each chapter. One issue was the reduction in size of National Board, currently at 48 members; you can imagine the logistics and difficulty of such an unwieldy board. There was also a move to rewrite the bylaws.

On February 13 a Webinar vote was cast whereby the Board would be restructured to a more manageable size and the bylaws would be rewritten. I assume this is happening this spring. Those bylaws will be brought to vote at the June 9 NB meeting. What they are, I have no idea. However,





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Jackie Henson, an attorney and chair of the Governance Committee, is writing them up now. She promises the chapter presidents will continue to have 30% of the voting power.

What this all means, I do not know. I have been as outspoken and verbal about these unknown changes as I can be. I am the only one able to vote on behalf of our chapter; I cannot send in a proxy or even have Helga, our co-president-elect, cast our vote, so I will do all I can to be present to represent you.

There is a lingering concern of mine that I am unwilling or unable to see beyond our local chapter. Perhaps I'm missing the BIG picture...the national picture. We do not have the big donors of Seattle, Portland, or Northern California, who are able to give several million-dollar gifts. Nor am I willing to embrace \$1,000 membership dues. Should I be more sympathetic with struggling chapters? Do I think we should assist them financially? So now I must stop myself; I am trying to fill the "unknowns" with my own thoughts — an unfair and dangerous place to go. All I can do is wait to hear what ARCS Foundation, Inc., proposes.

I will keep you current with all the news that comes my way.

A cell biology PhD candidate in the Encalada lab at The Scripps Research Institute, George described his research on how the nervous system uses a specialized system of transport proteins to carry molecular packages along the cellular highway of elongated nerve cells. Outside the lab, his hobbies have influenced the way that he does research. Archery helped him practice focus, and improvisational comedy has helped with communication, interpersonal connection, and the fear of public speaking. He went

on to inform us that he was fortunate to be raised by devoted parents and by his late grandmother. Watching his grandmother tirelessly work on her genealogy research allowed him to see firsthand the struggles of the research process and the perseverance needed to succeed. These skills will help George as he approaches the defense of his PhD dissertation this summer.

The keynote speaker, Dr. Julia Brown, gave a compelling and timely speech on the importance of leadership and giving back. Dr. Brown is a 30-year resident of San Diego and has focused her career in pharmaceuticals and biopharmaceuticals. She sits on several boards in San Diego, including Biodel, Inc., CONNECT, Cleantech San Diego, Girl Scouts San Diego, and the San Diego Symphony, and is also the chair of

the Corporate Directors Forum. Dr. Brown works through these boards to foster economic growth in San Diego, the creation of good jobs, and the promotion of high standards in corporate governance.

Fund Development Report

I am occasionally asked about the various types of donations, so for those of you who were not at the January General Meeting, I will try to clarify/explain.

Our Scholar Award Fund, or Annual Participation Donation, goes directly into Scholar funding for the next fiscal year; 100% of your donation goes toward funding a Scholar. Donating to the Scholar Fund not only helps our brilliant Scholars, but helps us attract foundation & business donors; the higher the percentage of our members making donations, the more appealing our organization. It's about showing your commitment to ARCS. To date we have received \$94,772.62 from members this fiscal year, which is 79.3% of our members. If you have not yet made a donation this year, please make one of any size to bring up our percentage.

Our **Endowment Funds** are monies that have been donated for endowment and reside permanently in the investment house; we can only use the annual income from those funds for our Scholar Awards, hence the endowments will continue to grow and fund Scholars for years to come. This year we received \$67,000 in annual income from our Endowment Funds for Scholar Awards. When you make a Memorial or Honorary donation, that money goes into our Endowment Fund, not directly to the Scholar Fund, and therefore cannot be counted in our % of member participation for annual Scholar donations, as it will not be used in the next year.

Anyone who has written ARCS, San Diego Chapter, into their will/estate planning becomes a member of our **Legacy Society**. Those funds which are left to ARCS will go into our Endowment Funds, thereby ensuring Scholar Awards into the future.

All of your donations to ARCS are tax deductible; your membership dues are used strictly for chapter expenses (printing, mailing, dues to ARCS National, etc.)

February Field Trip to TSRI


A field trip was held at The Scripps Research Institute on February 3, 2017. After a warm welcome, with delicious pastries and coffee, members and guests attended a fascinating lecture by Dr. Andrew Ward. Dr. Ward's goal is to determine the 3-D structure of proteins from microscopic organisms that cause disease, revealing weak spots that might be targeted with vaccines and drugs. Since starting his lab at TSRI in 2010, Ward has discovered new aspects of viruses including HIV, Influenza and Ebola

Virus. He was recently awarded the 2017 Viruses Young Investigator in Virology Prize by the Multidisciplinary Digital Publishing Institute (MDPI).

The group subsequently divided into three smaller groups to visit the Lander Lab with Danielle Grotjahn, the Ward Lab with Chris Cottrell, and the Havran Lab with Daisy Johnson. The three ARCS Scholars adroitly summarized the important and exciting research they are undertaking, and ARCS members and guests expressed the honor and privilege they felt for being a part of it.
