s you have probably heard by now, the 2018 Scientist of the Year dinner scheduled for April 19, has been postponed until Thursday, October 4, 2018.

About ten days ago, I received a call from the Salk Institute informing me that Dr. Gage, our honoree, would no longer be able to attend the event to accept the award and deliver the keynote address. This unfortunate and unanticipated situation is due to the fact that Dr. Gage was just appointed the Interim President of Salk and is now required to attend the Salk International Board meeting which occurs on the same date.

Since this happened, the SOY Dinner Planning Committee has met twice to consider how to proceed. The majority of the Committee felt that postponing the event, rather than having another scientist from Salk accept the award on Dr. Gage's behalf, was the preferred option. Fortunately, the Sheraton Hotel was able to move the event to October 4, 2018.

I know we are all disappointed, but the postponement gives us time to explore modifying the event that could support increasing attendance from the various segments of the San Diego STEM community.

Dr. Gage is still the 2018 Scientist of the Year and you will find his bio in a different place in the newsletter.

UCSD Scholars along with the Dean of the Graduate Division, Kit Pogliano, and Chancellor Khosla gathered at the UCSD Faculty Club on October 19 for the annual check presentation ceremony. ARCS members Helga Moore, President, and UCSD Liason Suzanne Dixon spoke briefly and did the introductions. Priscilla Moxley, VP for University Relations, and Past President Mary Fitz also attended. A check for \$252,500 was presented to the Chancellor. These current allocations added to the \$5.2 million given to UCSD by ARCS since chapter inception. The 31 current UCSD Scholars will increase the number of funded Scholars to over the 669 funded in the past. Two of the Scholars, Emily Nardoni and Igor Federov, gave moving and impressive statements on the role ARCS funding has played in their lives. The Chancellor's strong words of support and appreciation for ARCS were impressive. The group gathered on the patio for a group photo and then enjoyed refreshments and the interactions with colleagues. Many seemed reluctant to leave and stayed late - marks of a very good event.

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


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ARCS Bright Lights

Meet the 2018 Scientist of the Year



Fred "Rusty" H. Gage, Ph.D., Adler Professor in the Laboratory of Genetics, joined The Salk Institute in 1995. He received his Ph.D. in 1976 from The Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Gage's work concentrates on the adult central nervous system and unexpected plasticity and adaptability to environmental stimulation that remains throughout the life of all mammals. His lab showed that human beings are capable of growing new nerve cells throughout life, in a process called neurogenesis.

Gage's team explores how these cells can be prompted to become mature, functioning nerve cells in the adult brain and spinal cord. He also showed that environmental enrichment and physical exercise can enhance the growth of new brain cells. The team also continues to study the underlying cellular and molecular mechanisms of neurogenesis to find possible avenues to repair damaged or aging brains. In addition, Gage's lab also models human neurological and psychiatric disease in vitro using human stem cells and studies the genomic mosaicism that exists in the brain as a result of mobile elements that are active during neurogenesis. Gage's research has also revealed that mobile sequences of DNA called "jumping genes" are active in neural stem cells contributing to genomic mosaicism. Specifically, he is interested in how this mosaicism (different sets of genes within a single organism) may lead to differences in brain function between individuals. Prior to joining Salk, Dr. Gage was a Professor of Neuroscience at the University of California, San Diego. He is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a Member of the National Academy of Sciences and the Institute of Medicine, and American Philosophical Society, a foreign member of the European Molecular Biology Organization and a Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Gage has served as President of the Society for Neuroscience in 2002, and President of the International Society for Stem Cell Research 2011-2012.
