MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

By every measure, this past year has been remarkable for our Chapter. And none of our successes happened by accident. They were made possible by an extraordinary group of members who gave generously of their time, talent, energy, and resources to advance our mission. Here's what we accomplished together:

We raised more money than ever before to support next year's Scholars – an investment not only in exceptional students, but in the future of scientific discovery itself. Our Scientist of the Year event was an extraordinary success – not only raising much needed Scholar funds, but also significantly expanding awareness of ARCS and our mission.

In response to continuing federal reductions in scientific research funding, our Board unanimously approved a one-time supplemental award of \$3,000 for each of our 50 Scholars to help sustain their critical research during a challenging year. Building on that commitment, the Board also voted to dedicate a prudent portion of our interest income to increase annual Scholar awards from \$10,000 to \$12,500 beginning next year – a meaningful investment in the next generation of scientific leaders at a time when support is needed most.

This year also marked the first time we reached out to our Scholar Alumni to help support current Scholars. While the initial response was modest, every meaningful journey begins with a first step. We have opened the door to a new and important source of engagement that we look forward to growing in the future.

Several members attended San Diego's Innovation Night, a premier networking event to build relationships that could strengthen our mission for years to come. Those efforts are already bearing fruit, including the establishment of an exciting new educational partnership with the Sanford Burnham Prebys Medical Discovery Institute. We will welcome two additional Scholars in 2026-27, bringing our total to 52 and look forward to many years of fruitful collaboration.

We also strengthened our operational foundation by hiring an assistant to support our Website and Electronic Communications Manager. This ensures continuity, provides essential backup in case of emergency, and positions us to grow even more effectively in the future. Further building our capabilities, we engaged a freelance grant writer to scout and develop funding opportunities that will further increase support for our Scholars.

Finally our Chapter became the first in the ARCS national pilot program to host a hospitality booth at a major scientific conference, the Biomedical Engineering Society Annual Meeting. This gave us the opportunity to reconnect with ARCS Scholar Alumni and elevate the visibility of ARCS at one of the scientific community's premier gatherings.

Taken together, these accomplishments reflect far more than a successful year. They demonstrate a Chapter defined by commitment, resilience, and vision. At a time when support for scientific research faces unprecedented challenges, we chose not to retreat – we chose to lead. We chose to invest more deeply in our Scholars, strengthen our partnerships, expand our visibility, and build a stronger foundation for the future.

We accomplished all of this together. My deepest gratitude goes to our dedicated Board and every member whose passion and commitment made this year both extraordinarily productive and deeply rewarding. It has been one of the greatest privileges of my professional and personal life to serve as your Chapter President these past two years, and I will always be grateful for the opportunity to lead this remarkable organization.

WHO WE ARE: THE HISTORY of ARCS

October 4, 1957, was a game-changer. On that date, Russia launched Sputnik, a 183-pound satellite, roughly the size of a beach ball, into space. This surprise launch shocked the United States and forced it to rethink its place as the technological leader of the world. It also ushered in the Space Age and the Cold War. The Russian action touched all areas of America, including politics, patriotism, science, the military, and education. In response, the U.S. undertook an unprecedented push to educate Americans in science and math.

As part of that initiative, a group of women in Los Angeles saw the opportunity to make a difference by creating a partnership between science and society. Their goal was to re-establish and re-energize the technological superiority of the United States. They started the first ARCS chapter in September 1958. ARCS (Achievement Rewards for College Scientists) is a nationally recognized nonprofit organization founded and administered by women who volunteer their time and talent to support American advancement in STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) and in biomedical research. It is now comprised of 15 chapters across the nation.

In 1985, four San Diego women established ARCS Foundation, San Diego Chapter: Karen Bowden, Karon Luce, Barbara McColl, and Pattie Wellborn. Forty-one years later, ARCS San Diego has provided almost \$14 million in financial awards to the brightest STEM scholars at four local academic institutions. By investing in these scholars, we are securing a better future for America and the world.

Scholars must be U.S. citizens and meet ARCS-established academic criteria with a minimum 3.5 GPA, while pursuing graduate degrees in a wide range of scientific subjects. These Scholars are specializing in astronomy, biochemistry, botany, cell and molecular biology, chemistry, computer science, ecology, engineering, genetics, marine biology, mathematics, medical research, oceanography, physics and more.

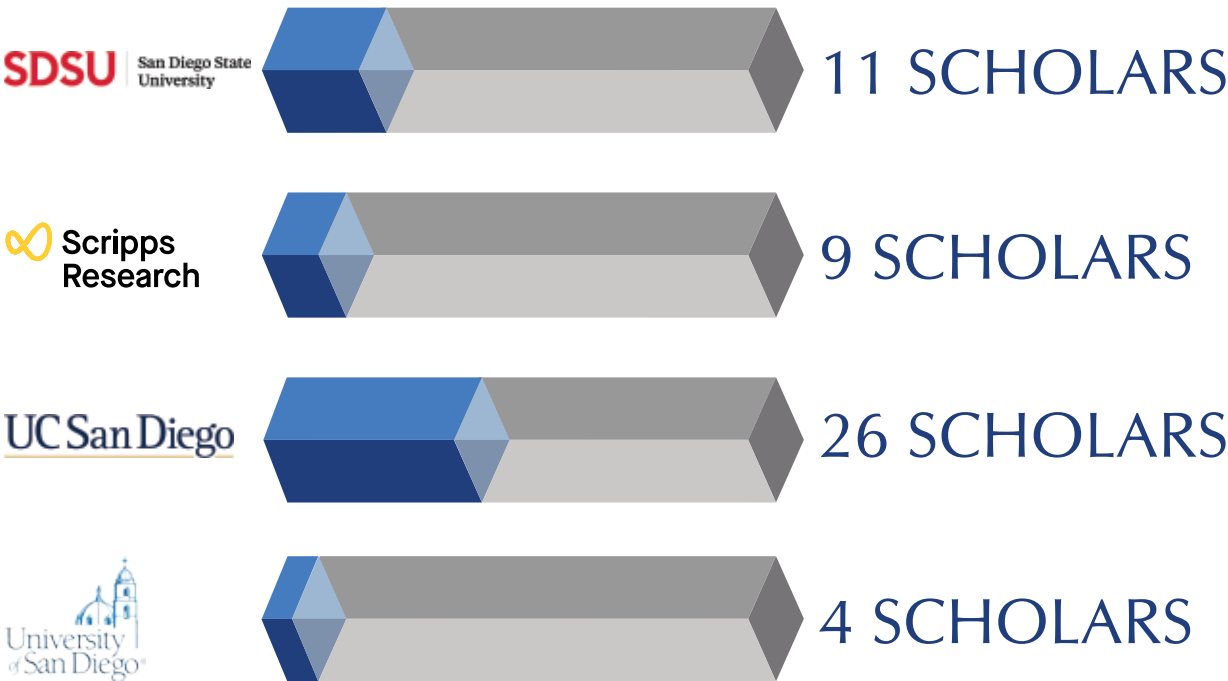

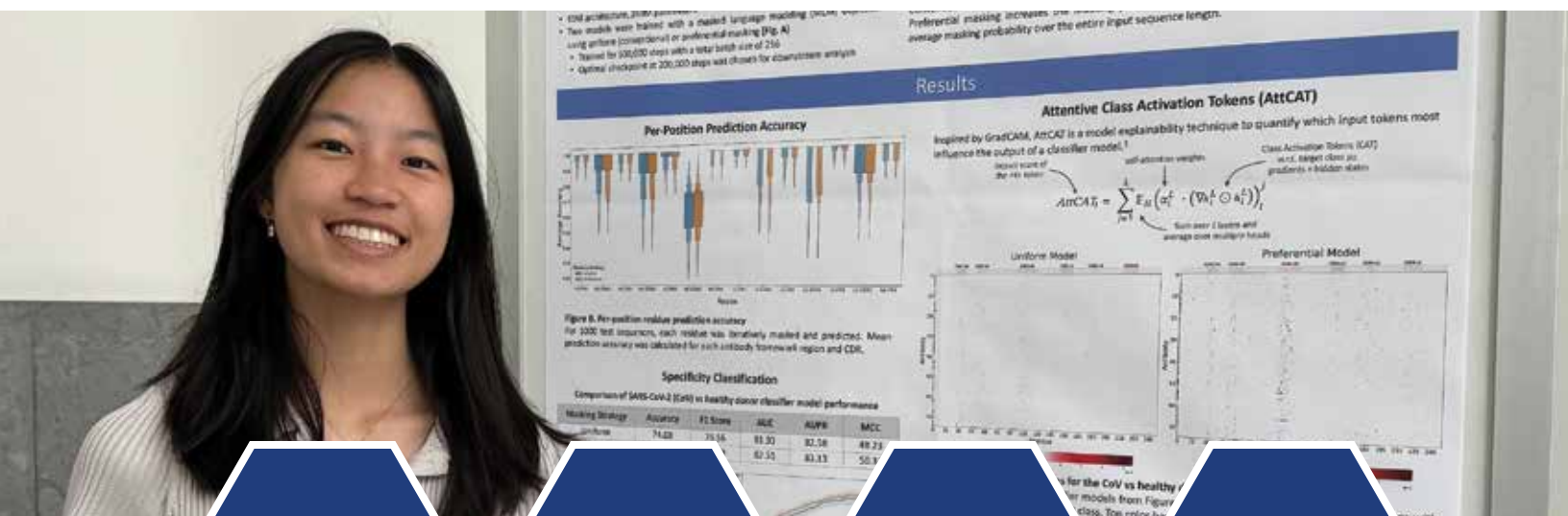

2026 SCIENTIST of THE YEAR CELEBRATION



Nearly 200 guests gathered at The Conrad in La Jolla on May 17 to celebrate Dr. Sonia Ancoli-Israel, the 2026 ARCS Scientist of the Year, whose groundbreaking research has transformed our understanding of sleep, aging, and health.

The evening began with a reception featuring 18 of this year's 50 ARCS Scholars, who shared their innovative research during a poster session. The main program followed with the traditional Scholar processional, a moving video tribute highlighting all 50 Scholars, and reflections from ARCS Scholar alum Noah Milman on the impact of his award.

Dr. Ancoli-Israel's keynote address was the evening's highlight. Drawing on a lifetime of research, she shared insights into the relationship between sleep, aging, cognition, and overall health, including the importance of treating sleep disorders and using light therapy to improve circadian rhythms. With warmth and humility, she credited the many colleagues and students who contributed to her success and accepted a commemorative artwork, *Time and Dreams Intertwined*, created by Janet Hubka of Ilus Art. The celebration concluded with dessert and conversation, leaving guests inspired by a remarkable evening honoring science, discovery, and mentorship.



SONIA ANCOLI-ISRAEL, PhD – 2026 SCIENTIST OF THE YEAR

Dr. Ancoli-Israel is a world-renowned leader in sleep and circadian rhythm research. A dedicated mentor and advocate for scientific discovery, she exemplifies the values and mission of ARCS Foundation. She has served as President of the Sleep Research Society and the Society for Light Treatment and Biological Rhythms, and has received numerous honors, including the National Sleep Foundation Lifetime Achievement Award, the Society of Behavioral Sleep Medicine Distinguished Career Award, and the SRS Distinguished Scientist Award. Her research on sleep, circadian rhythms, light therapy, and aging has been widely published and featured in national media.



NOAH MILMAN – ARCS OREGON SCHOLAR ALUMNUS SPEAKER

Noah is a graduate student in the Sleep & Health Applied Research Program (SHARP) lab at Oregon Health & Science University under advisor Dr. Miranda Lim. His research, using rodent species, focuses on the relationship between early life, sleep and autism or social behavior, and development and early life sleep in all mammals.

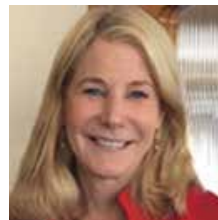

OUR ALUMNI – CHANGING THE WORLD!

Thousands of ARCS Scholar alumni go on to make outstanding contributions to advance science and keep America competitive. Here are just a few standouts from our chapter.



ALBERT STRICKER, MS (1998–1999, SDSU), is Public Works Director for the City of Rancho Cordova, California, where he leads efforts to enhance safety, connectivity, and community spaces. He previously worked for the City of San Diego and engineering firms Ninyo & Moore and PBS&J. Albert holds a BS in Groundwater Hydrology and an MS in Civil Engineering from San Diego State University and is a member of the American Public Works Association.



KERRY HANSON, PhD (1993-1997, UCSD), earned her PhD in Chemistry from UCSD in 1997 and completed postdoctoral research at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, where she studied two-photon fluorescence imaging of UV-induced reactive oxygen species in skin. Since joining the University of California, Riverside in 2005, Dr. Hanson has focused on the photochemical and photophysical properties of sunscreen UV filters. She also has 15 years of consulting experience with sunscreen R&D leaders, has provided expert witness services in patent litigation, and is committed to community outreach and scientific literacy in Riverside.



WILLIAM REDMOND, PhD (2001-2004, SCRIPPS RESEARCH), earned his PhD in Immunology at Scripps Research and is now a Full Member at the Earle A. Chiles Research Institute in Portland, Oregon, where he directs the Immune Monitoring Laboratory. His research focuses on cancer immunotherapy, using advanced immune profiling and tumor models to identify biomarkers that improve understanding of treatment responses. Dr. Redmond's work has been supported by leading organizations including the NIH, American Cancer Society, and V Foundation.
